
Here are some photos from August 4<sup>th</sup> to 7<sup>th</sup>.

Music brought out the serious side and the laughing side of those playing and those standing by. The rest of us were in tears.




"Nzuri sana!" Words from Mr. Mosha, Academic Master, as he watched the children from the primary school play the viola.

Form 2 students at Ngateu.


















Lauren, Lisha, Mya and Sarah handed out socks. Oh my, they were bright and colorful!
