From Executive Director, Mary Nelson:

2019 was another good year for Safi. I am grateful to all of you who gave of your time, money and caring for students in Tanzania.

So, in no particular order:

- 1. All Safi sponsored students who finished Form 4, or secondary school, in 2019 passed the national exam and are qualified to continue their education for at least two years. Statistics show that only a third of students pass this government examination.
- 2. One of the main reasons that our Safi sponsored students have done so well is the remedial program that Safi board member Chris Gourley and her Tanzanian partners teach each year to help prepare Safi students with how to take the national examination.
- 3. Many of our Safi students have finished school and are employed and some are still awaiting government appointments. Safi supports 83 students in post-secondary schools. Some of these students are on an academic pathway to university and some are in technical schools. These schools typically cost more than secondary school and transportation and living expenses are the student's responsibilities. For students who are unable to even afford tuition, meeting those expenses is often very difficult. Safi helps as much as we can.
- 4. A dream come true for nonprofits working in another country: Baraka Mosha, our Safi consultant in Arusha, and others have formed a new group named "Sponsoring Youth, Empowering Women," or "SYEW". Students are encouraged to 'give back' as they have received so much help. They are working on plans for moving forward with our Safi goals and have shared some excellent ideas. The purposeful Travel group will meet with them and bring back their proposals to the Safi board.
- 5. A thought for the future of Safi is to hire a part-time Executive Director who would help Safi with fund raising.
- 6. Baraka Mosha should be invited to come to the USA to visit, speak to other groups concerning Safi's work in Tanzania, to study and perhaps teach.

Thank you to all of Safi's donors, board members and many volunteers for making Safi 'work' for the students in Tanzania because of all of you, Safi can succeed.
